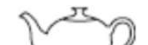

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## CARING FOR YOUR CHINA

It is important that your china is stored securely in the cupboards and that a felt protector is placed in between each piece.

Use a rubber spatula to scrap food remnants off of the plates/bowls. Give a quick rinse and stack ready for washing.

If the china is plain and has no trim or applied design aspect like crystals, then it should be fine to place these items in a dishwasher. Be sure to use a mild non chemical detergent and rinse aid. Upon removing from dishwasher wipe with a dry cloth.

For formal china with a precious metal trim and applied designs make sure you hand wash and carefully dry each item. Make sure you have a silicone sink mat at the bottom of your sink and only use a soft dishcloth or sponge, nothing with a scrubber/scourer.

Do not pack away your china until it is thoroughly dry.

If your tea/coffee cups stain, you can wash them in a one part hydrogen peroxide three parts water solution.
